There's a lot been going on in Central Office this month and I am proud to introduce a new member of staff, Malcolm Little. Malcolm has been employed as our fundraising liaison coordinator. Having shifted to a donation based finance model just prior to Christmas, it was

I've also tasked Malcolm with looking at a project to provide a mentoring scheme for personnel leaving the Royal Navy. This would be geared primarily towards support for individuals finding

employment and I would envisage a scheme whereby shipmate's could volunteer to become mentors to help individuals with their CV, with their interview technique, and just arm them with a little bit of guidance to make that successful leap into the civilian job market after their naval career. Let's face it, those who are leaving after 22 years with their pension, probably joined aged 18-25 so therefore are popping out aged 40-47; they are probably in the thick end of a mortgage, they might also have school fees to consider and the bottom line is the Pussers pension is probably not sufficient to allow the luxury of filling their pipe with their favourite baccy, sticking on their slippers and watching daytime telly or, better still, now that the golf courses are open again, attempting to reduce their handicap. No, or rather, not yet, and finding meaningful and rewarding employment will be important to most. This will be open to all leavers of course not just those who have cracked the 22. We've been in touch with RFEA, The Forces Employment Charity – link here, who have the responsibility of running the Careers Transition Partnership (CTP) and are seeking a relationship with them and also of course with the White Ensign Association . Shipmates will remember the *Shipmates and Oppo's* programme which was run by the Association for many years until funding ceased early last year and I see this

opportunity as a resurrection of this programme albeit with a more focused output. We are all about comradeship in the RNA and I see this as another important string to our bow.

Good news from Lynda Pearson too on the befriending front as she seeks to launch the Sparko TV pilot initiative this month with a few "Special Agents" to see how it performs before hopefully broadening the scheme to a wider audience. Sparko is aimed at those who really can't get to grips with social media and IT so they will be able to use their TV to reach a range of activities and also to communicate face 2 face with shipmates/family – very clever!

♦ Welfare Spotlight Column – Good and Bad News on Covid.



Good News and Better Days keep coming with decreases in Covid infections and deaths to low levels and the start of a return to normality unfolding with restrictions beginning to ease across the UK. Details in this Spotlight were current as of 29 March but always check locally as things continue under review in all the devolved administrations and there are differences across the devolved administrations.

England began its **Step 1** of the roadmap out of lockdown on 29 March see details at (https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/covid-19-response-spring-2021/covid-19-response-spring-2021-summary). 29 March though was a great day for everyone with the sun coming out (literally) in most places and marked by the start of easing of restrictions with that all important and long-awaited opportunity to meet with family and friends.

So, what can you do in England from 29 March? Meet up to six people or two households outdoors

Only socialise indoors with people you live with or who are in your support bubble "Stay at home" message ended but people urged to minimise travel Work from home if you can and only travel when necessary Attend outdoor sports and leisure facilities, so a chance to get out there and your chosen leisure activity

Participate in organised sports such as grassroots football
Meet outdoors for Parents and Child groups with up to 15 parents
Hold weddings with six attendees, can be held but hopefully increasing in April
Hold funerals with up to 30 mourners, can be held but do check the local rules



And What can't you do?

Mix households indoors
Stay overnight at someone else's house
Holiday abroad
Shop in non-essential retail outlets
Use gyms and indoor sports facilities, which remain closed
Use Pubs and restaurants indoors, which remain closed



Step 2 (no earlier than 12 April and under review) in England will allow business and activities to resume in areas of retail, personal care, indoor leisure and most outdoor attractions, hospitality (but only outdoors). However, there's no need for customers to order a substantial meal with alcoholic drinks and no curfew, but customers must order, eat and drink while seated ('table service' only!). Funerals can continue with up to 30 mourners but the number of people able to attend weddings, receptions and commemorative events such as wakes will rise to 15 from 6.

Scotland will replace "Stay at Home" with 'Stay Local' from 2 April with restrictions on non-essential travel across local authority boundaries remaining in place. People must stay within their council area for non-essential shopping and should only travel to another area for essential shopping if there are no practical alternatives. Further easing is planned from 5 April with the opening of hairdressers, garden centres, car showrooms and forecourts, homeware stores and non-essential click and collect services. Details are at https://www.gov.scot/publications/coronavirus-covid-19-timetable-for-easing-restrictions/

Wales lifted the "stay local" restriction on 27 March and also allowed self-contained accommodation to re-open, resumption of outdoor children's activities, re-opening of libraries and archive services, and social distanced meeting outdoors of people from 2 households.

Remember a reasonable excuse, such as work, is needed to travel in or out of Wales although no limit on travel within Wales and holiday accommodation is **only** open for people living in Wales. Details on the rules at https://gov.wales/restrictions-from-27-march.

Northern Ireland's restrictions are similar to the rest of the UK but you must not leave your home without reasonable excuse e.g. to access medical services and essential shopping. From April 1 up to six people (including children) from no more than two households can meet up outdoors in a private garden with social distancing and from 12 April up to 10 people (including children) from no more than two households can meet up outdoors in a private garden with social distancing and up to up to six people from a maximum of two households to meet in a non-domestic indoor setting. Overnight stays in a private home remain not allowed unless it is a member of your bubble, with some exemptions. Yet better news is the onward march of vaccination in the UK with more than 30 million having had their first jab and more than 3 million their second jab gives support to continued easing of restrictions. Everyone is encouraged to take up their jab when offered. Jabs are mandatory but the weight of evidence is that the three UK options (Astra Zeneca, Pfizer and Moderna) give protection from first jab across the age groups, are safe and can help reduce the spread of the virus. However, let's not forget that this is only the start of easing and many restrictions continue for the protection of all. Most important of all, if you have symptoms get a test quickly and stay at home.

However, with all this good news we must not forget those of our shipmates who still find themselves in effect, in isolation. For example, shielding in England ended on 31 March but the medical advice has been to still take precautions, which in practice for many can mean staying in isolation. All of us must continue our efforts at local Branch level to support shipmates by a phone call, text, email or virtually through Zoom and Facetime. Isolation and the loneliness that it brings can be crippling to mental health. BZs to all those RNA Branches across the UK reaching out and keeping that "arm around the shoulder" that makes such a difference. Please keep it up and let's make it "normal operating procedure" for 2021. We must not forget either our hidden, lost and lonely shipmates and make best efforts to support them as well.

Last month I outlined the impacts of loneliness and isolation on our own mental health and that of others and listed ten ways in which to combat that. Try these to help yourself. Previously we've shared helpful apps to make you an "Appy Shipmate". Some, such as Veterans Gateway and Forces Connect, offer welfare support and information in 24/7 directories of what's out there in your local area to help with issues such as finances, housing, employment, relationships, physical and mental health. Easily downloadable from Apple Store or Google Play.

Others focus on particular areas. One such is *Drinks*:Ration which could help you to feel better and save money by drinking less. This smartphone app for android and iPhone aims to help veterans understand more about their drinking and reduce the amount they drink; it provides advice and support for those who want to cut down their alcohol use. The app is in development still and your input and support as a veteran can help improve its effectiveness and your suggestions on how they can improve/modify the app are very welcome.

Why not give it a try and share your information via the app? You will be helping yourself and others. If you are having a problem with alcohol, this app can help with extra support available confidentially to those who need it. More information on the study website at https://drinksration.app/.

I end by welcoming Shipmate Selwyn Davies on board as the new Deputy National Welfare Advisor (Selwyn@royalnavalassoc.com). Selwyn of No 7 Area is very well experienced and active in RNA welfare work. I look forward to working together as we aim to support all shipmates with advice on welfare queries and helpful information plus support to all Area and Branch Welfare Officers. With Central Office shipmates we will continue the increased focus of RNA on welfare in 2021 and beyond. Look out for future news.

We are incredibly proud, excited and overwhelmed to announce that Project Semaphore has been awarded a further £70,000 from the <u>Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust's Tackling Loneliness Programme</u>.



This funding will allow us to run the programme for a further two years! Project Semaphore provides elderly veterans with iPads and the specialist training to use them, delivered by a team of RNA volunteers. The initiative allows veterans who were previously isolated and disconnected to get online, reconnect with long-lost family and friends, access welfare support, order their shopping and prescriptions, and

access the world of entertainment available online.

We can't wait to keep you updated as we relaunch the project and get to work with the next phase of iPad training delivery. The money isn't in our account just yet and we have an existing waiting list to work through, but we will let you know when we can accept new applications to the project...



In light of the ongoing Covid crisis and the restrictions this poses on gatherings of any kind, the decision has been made to push the date of the 2021 National Conference to **Saturday 4th September**, in the hope that there is a much better chance of it taking place. 9. 🖈 Borneo/Brunei Insurrection - December 1962

During the Borneo uprising of December 1962 Royal Marines were sent to the village of Limbang where the District Officer was being held by communist rebels. During the night of 11/12 December 1962 a Company of Royal Marines from 42 Commando, L Company, with two Z-craft or motorised barges, ferried the Marines commanded by Captain Jeremy Moore (the future Commandant General Royal Marines), upriver to Limbang in Sarawak.



At dawn, all appeared quiet on the final approach to Limbang, when "all hell let loose". The well-armed insurgents, positioned on rooftops and in trees, fired down on the barges, and the first attempt to land the marines had to be aborted when the Coxswain was shot. The second attempt to land was successful but very sadly resulted in the death of five Marines and two sailors wounded. The action resulted in Lt David Wills RN being awarded the DSC and Capt Moore RM a Bar to his MM.

Whilst relaying this story to Shipmate Keith Ridley, our National Chairman, he told the following story relating to his time in HMS Albion, which was sent to Borneo in 1962, and a footnote to the Limbang Raid story.

The good Ship ALBION arrived off Brunei on the morning

of 13 December, but it may have been 12th, around the time of the Limbang Raid.

We had just completed a 28 knot high speed run to Singapore 2 days after leaving Mombasa. At the time of the Admiralty signal being received tasking us to Brunei, our skipper, Capt Colin Madden DSC** was being shaved in the Crossing the Line Ceremony. We RAS'd to War State from a RFA some 50 miles ahead of us using our 26 helicopters (845 & 846 NAS's), RASing fuel when we caught up with the RFA. We had a 5 hour pit stop in Singapore (1600-2100 hrs) taking onboard remnants of 42 RM Cmdo, to compliment 40 RM Cmdo & a Battery of 29 Cmdo Royal

Artillery already onboard. By 1000 on the 12 or 13th we had deployed the Commando ashore holding one Company in reserve.

I recall doing outside machinery rounds finding boxes of ammo; Bren Gun Clips, loose rounds & GRENADES along the main passageway, and along which most commando Messdecks were located. For a Junior Stoker just 7 weeks past his 17th birthday along with my Shipmates, we had stepped up to the mark. Following our return to the UK some 17 months later having been hard at it involved with the Indonesian Confrontation, I was proud to have served. At the end of the Confrontation in August 1966, approx 130 Brothers



in Arms had made the ultimate sacrifice. Sadly, who would have thought further Campaigns, indeed Wars would follow claiming many Servicemen's lives. May they RIP.

Footnote.....

Lima Company of 42 Cmdo was renamed Limbang Company in Honour of their loss that day. Approximately, 5 years back whilst waiting to collect a client at Heathrow I came across a RM Cmdo Sgt in jungle greens. I exchanged some banter and established he was serving with 42 Cmdo. 12. ★ Fastest Ship in the Fleet...... Well so far as we know......

Central Office received an email recently from both the National President, Vice Admiral John McAnally and Tim Lewin concerning the 9 minute video of a full power trial featuring HMS Cavalier and HMS Rapid which prompted a debate as to what was the fastest ship in the fleet.

Dear All, it's a quiet afternoon here so I watched this 9 minute film again to lift my spirits; then I wanted to share it. This is an edited, by me, version of the 20 minute poor quality, but stirring, silent film in the IWM archives of the 1970? full power trial of HMS Cavalier and HMS Rapid, both 1943 emergency destroyers, both in late middle age, both giving it absolutely all they have got, and more. Cavalier won by having 20 feet of her focsle ahead of Rapid, this after 63 miles of hard steaming. If you are not moved by this, you are not old enough!

273 revolutions, 32.6 kts, with feeling . https://vimeo.com/277260483

Admiral John responded...... Those were the days and those were the ships. In ALACRITY we held the record for a passage from New Orleans to the Gulf of Mexico- 120 miles at 25 knots by night in a strengthening gale; 15 knots above the speed limit – to escape a hurricane. I've taken the liberty of copying this to RNA colleagues. Two of whom being engineers will no doubt applaud the combustion of both ships which looks like a copybook thin brown haze!

Having watched the video in the link Shipmate Darby Allen contributed by informing us that having delved into his collection of RN books of the 1960's navy, he confirmed that HMS Manxman had a top speed of 40knots at full power (72,000 hp). She was one of 6 dedicated minelayers, 3 being lost during WW2. HMS Apollo was still in service in 1960 but the other, HMS Ariadne was in the Devonport Reserve Fleet. Darby remembers going onboard Ariadne, to remove a Latitude Rider from the Gyro Compass, we were cannibalising in those days to keep our ships operational. Has anything changed!

HMS Manxman was converted to become the 6th Mine Sweeping Squadron's support ship in April 1963. She took over from HMS Woodbridge Haven, when I was leaving the squadron after a very interesting time in those good old days, when we had a China Fleet based in Singapore and Hong Kong.

S/M Andy Christie said that all this discussion of fastest ships and ship racing made him recall a 'modern navy dit'......

Whist attending a Families at Sea Day about 6/7 years ago on my Daughters Ship HMS Sutherland (T23) we had a race from a standing start with HMS York (T42) who was pottering off the Isle of Wight. Both Captains were leaning over their respective bridge wings waving 'grand prix' type flags to start the race. All the Families in Sutherland were going nuts cheering the

Fighting Clan on and so were the Ships Company in HMS York (They had a clear lower deck).......

The result was a draw as mid race with Olympus, Tyne's and Spey's at full throttle the race was suspended because a cross channel ferry inadvertently tried to join the race! Everyone was booing, but I have to say the noise from those engines was incredible and so was the rooster tails. I just wish I had a photo to show you, I'll bet there are plenty around though.

Finally, S/M Darby.....

However, I do remember the race between the Cavalier and as I thought the Rocket. And was reminded of a time in the summer of 1961 when my then ship, HMS Chaplet returned to Devonport to pay off for disposal. On the trip back from Harwich it was decided to have a Full Power Trial all the way back in order to burn fuel and save some time with defuelling when back alongside.

The sea state was a flat calm all the way and having worked up to full power there was a huge Rooster Tail in the wake that you could not see over. I am not sure of the actual speed, probable 32 - 33 knots but she equalled her first full power trial of 1948.

Central Office received the email below from RN veteran Alan Ewart who has requested assistance with his project.

Dear Shipmates,

I am writing to tell you about a project I am working on for the 40th Anniversary of the Falklands war in the hope that you might be able to assist me. I hope you will bear with me whilst I tell you a little bit about myself and the project.

I am a Royal Navy veteran and retired Police officer. I was deployed elsewhere during the war but lost two good friends onboard HMS Coventry, and my younger brother was on HMS Argonaut when she was bombed. I did serve on Falklands guard ship duties on HMS Southampton from September 84 - March 85. I then spent 27-years as a police officer until I was retired as a result of PTSD in 2013. I worked as a photographer and writer for UK music magazines and an American news agency before returning to university in 2018. I graduated in 2019 with a Master of Arts (Photography) degree.

I am currently planning a project honouring those who served during the 1982 war, especially those still on patrol in the South Atlantic. I am looking for veterans of the war including those who

were non-military members of the task force who might volunteer a little of their time to assist me with the project.

The task for volunteers is not onerous. I need a photo of them from that era, preferably in uniform. I will visit them to take some photographs of them as they are now and to conduct a short interview about their personal experiences. This is about the personal rather than the operational. Interviews can be video, audio, or even by questionnaire if that is the volunteer's preference. Once the UK phase is complete I will travel to the Falkland Islands to repeat the process with Falkland Islanders.

The finished project will be exhibited in the Falkland Islands during the 40th commemorations, and then in the UK. I hope to accompany the exhibition with a short film based on the interviews and aim to release a book of the entire project.

I am delighted to say that my project has the full support of the Falkland Islands government, I attach a copy of their letter of support for your information.

So how can you help?

It should be clear that this is an expensive venture with costs running to many thousands. I am currently applying for funding grants from a variety of sources. Those funding bids are considerably strengthened when I can show support I have raised myself. Funding raised doesn't necessarily have to be cash donations, any "benefit in kind" such as reduced costs for accommodation can strengthen a funding bid.

My own financial contribution is very significant. I am running this as a not for profit venture, I am not taking a wage, my wife is offering admin support for free, and all profits will be donated to service charities. Obviously, I would be grateful for any financial or benefit in kind you might be able to offer, but there are other ways you could help.

I would be grateful if you could share this information with your members, and perhaps on any social media channels. You might be interested in being a "partner" organisation, something I think might be of benefit to us both? You may be able to signpost organisations who might be willing to make a financial contribution (however small).

If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to ask. Thank you for your consideration.



There have been so many changes to the way business is conducted by all staff, and yet the care and support and sense of humour shared with our lovely residents has never wavered. To keep the deadly virus at bay for so many months was a huge achievement, and we can look forward to the future with increased confidence. The sad loss of four of our residents to the virus over the Christmas and New Year period was a cruel blow, and we remember them particularly today.

I would also like to pay tribute to the HQ staff who have adapted to the challenges of three lockdowns with ingenuity, skill and camaraderie and no little humour. We have continued to focus on the delivery of benevolence to the RNBT Family, which has continuously and successfully been achieved. I would also like to thank our volunteers of the Grant Committee who continue to give us their wisdom and experience and have maintained their role in deciding on particularly complex and high value grant awards.

Work on Admiral Jellicoe House, our centenary care home project which started on 4th January continues. Sir Tom also wrote that it was, 'Odd and rather touching to think that people might weep over my passing – strangers I've never met'.

We have never met Sir Tom but on behalf of Aylesbury No.1 Branch of the Royal Naval Association we Salute You and say, 'Thank you for your service Sir, may you rest in peace, Duty Done'.

Mrs Connie Gregory, 98 years, served as an Officers Steward in Warsash, Hampshire. Until recently she has been the Chairman of the Wren's Association, Bristol Branch. She is also an accomplished musician and has entertained many visitors to the S.S. Great Britain located in Bristol's Floating Harbour for a number of years.

Kenneth George Williams, 97 years, served from 29th July 1942 until 16th July, 1946 as an Able Seaman Gunner. Initial training in HMS Raleigh was followed by time on H.M. Ships Victory, Eagle in Ireland, Excellent, Saker in New York, Irwell in Liverpool followed by time on Vimy and

Assistance. Ken was involved in Atlantic, Artic and Pacific convoys during which time he visited Iceland, Newfoundland, America, Russia and Australia among many other ports. Ken is the proud holder of the following medals 1939-1945 Star, Atlantic Star, Artic Star, Pacific Star, and the 1939-45 War and Defence medals.

Eric Talbot, 95 years, joined in Portsmouth in 1944 and received training in Rosyth for minesweeping duties. He joined minesweeper HMS Albacore in Malta. Operations took place along the North Africa coast and in the Mediterranean. He remembers that on one occasion the ship was surrounded by 40 floating mines which were despatched by rifle fire. Eric was a member of an armed landing party in Greece whilst the Germans were retreating northwards. Whilst in Greece he visited places where his father served with the Manchester Regiment during the First World War. Later his ship swept along the Western coast of Italy. Eric was shaken but not injured when a mine exploded on the quarterdeck killing the First Lieutenant and injuring several seamen. Returning home Eric served on HMS Frisbee and finished his service as a Leading Stoker. Eric does not remember being afraid at any time - he just got on with it, TRUE SERVICE SPIRIT.

Ken Knight – RNA Dortchester

Sadly, the Dorchester branch has to announce that Shipmate Ken Knight has 'Crossed the Bar'.

Shipmate Ken served for 39 years and 4 months in the naval service. He was a founder member of the Dorchester branch and served as the NCM for Area 4.

When he was 15, Ken decided that he wanted to join the Royal Navy. His parents were not keen on the idea but they did not stand in his way. In June 1964, aged 15½ he joined the service at HMS Ganges as a JM(E)2. In July 1965 he joined HMS AURORA in the Portland Squadron. During his career, he served in the following ships: HMS ORION, HMS PUMA, HMS CENTAUR, HMS EAGLE, HMS JUPITER, HMS BERWICK, HMS CHARYBDIS, HMS NORFOLK, HMS BERWICK and HMS NIAID. He also served at HMS FISGARD as a Divisional Instructor, at HMS RALEIGH as a Part One Instructor and on a second occasion as a Leading Rate Leadership School Instructor, CPOMEM(M) Ken Knight's last draft was to HMS ROYAL ARTHUR where he was a Leading Rate Leadership Course and Petty Officer Leadership Course Instructor, and the Assistant Barrack Master.

Ken left active service in September 1988 and joined the Naval Careers Service as a Careers Adviser, first at the Birmingham Office, then at the Worcester Office and then at the Birmingham and Coventry Office. He then moved to Stanley Barracks at Bovington where he helped to establish the Royal Naval School of Recruiting. By the time that he retired, the school had grown from a staff of two to a team of nine. Ken's roles at the school were Careers Service Instructor, Training Design and Quality Control.

On retiring from the Royal Navy in 2003, Ken worked for a further 10 years in an Army civilian post at Bovington, where he was the sole administrator for all the training computers. He finally retired in 31 March 2014.

Shortly after leaving the Royal Navy, Ken was diagnosed with Muscular Dystrophy. Eventually, Ken had to use a mobility scooter, but this did not stop him being actively involved in running, or contributing to, the organisations that he was a member of.

Ken had been a member of the Caravanning and camping Christian Fellowship for many years. Some of the other organisations that he was involved with were Crossways library as a volunteer, the University of the Third Age (U3A) as a group leader, The Dorchester Disabled Club, Tincleton Church as a churchwarden, The Dorset Division of the HMS Ganges Association and the RNA.

Ken had been the branch vice-chairman since our commissioning in 1999. He was also the National Council member for number 4 Area from June 2010 to June 2018 when he stood down because of his muscle condition. In recent years, one can only admire him for stoically

coping with his disability and for the contribution he continued to make to the running of the branch, the Area and the RNA.

Ken's passing has left a void in many lives. The Dorchester branch will miss his wise council and friendship.

Janet Dalton - RNA Torrevieja Branch

Very sadly Torrevieja Branch have to report that Shipmate Janet Ann Dalton crossed the bar on 14th February 2021, aged 76.

Our 'oppo', Janet Dalton, a former 'Jenny Wren' - Women's Royal Naval Service (WRNS) and shipmate of the Royal Naval Association (RNA) Torrevieja Branch sadly 'crossed the bar' before us and leaves a huge gap for her husband Bryan, their daughter Evonne and partner Tony in Christchurch, New Zealand; Granddaughter Jade, also a former 'Jenny Wren' in Taunton; their Son Michael, partner Becky and their



children in Wellington - Somerset; her sister Pat and family in Maltby – Yorkshire and her sister Eileen and family in South Anston – Yorkshire, the members of her local religious group and not forgetting all her friends both locally in Spain and in France and UK; who are unfortunately too many to mention at this time.

It is with enormous regret by everyone, but especially Bryan, that although her passing was not due to COVID19 that the related restrictions imposed by the Santa Lucia hospital in Cartagena prevented anyone other than the medical staff from being at her side when she 'crossed the bar'.

Bryan is enormously grateful that the local COVID restriction was raised enough for there to be 15 people allowed to attend her Service of Remembrance at the local Tanatorio Dos Mares in El Alga on Thursday the 18^{th of} February 2021 at 1200hrs., which was superbly conducted by her



religious group. He is also immensely appreciative of the support that Janet's religious group provided both Janet and him during her time in hospital and the ongoing support he is receiving.

Janet had an interesting life from the time she was born in Maltby - Yorkshire as the eldest of four sisters, unfortunately one of her sisters Eunice pre-deceased Janet, then through her time in the 'Andrew' (Royal Navy) from where she joined as a 'Wren' on H.M.S. Dauntless on the 17^{th of} September 1963, then through her Air Mechanic training on board H.M.S. Condor, where she became a Fleet Air Arm Wren (as an old term affectionately known 'Wrenlin') and then in service in Station Flight on board H.M.S. Fulmar, where she was first working on Search and Rescue (SAR) Helicopters and Visiting Aircraft, then with the 764 Squadron on Hunter T8 aircraft and then finally at the Engine Repair Section of the Aircraft Repair Workshops before 'de-mob' (leaving the Royal

Navy) in December 1965.

She met Bryan during her Expedition Training Weekend in Nov 1964, where Bryan as the Expedition Leader 'took her under his wing' and consequently things 'took flight' from there. They married in Oct 1965 and subsequently she left the RN to be with Bryan when he was posted to Lee-on-Solent for his mechanicians course in December 1965 and qualified as a RELMN(A) in December 1967.

Subsequently from January 1968 Janet and her children moved around the country with Bryans draft's where the first was back to Lossiemouth, followed by a time with Bryan's draft to RAF Honington in 1972, then 'up sticks again' and a quick hop over to Yeovil in 1979 where they stayed after Bryan was 'de-mobbed' and became a civvy in February 1983, before finally ending up in Blackburn in 1988. Janet and Bryan then went on their International travels through France and Spain with their mobile camper van when Bryan took early retirement through redundancy in 2000.



She and Bryan settled in La Manga (Costa Calida,

Spain) in 2005 and started to build a social community of local friends, and re-established her active involvement in a religious group, joined the Association of WRENS and the RNA in Torrevieja, while still pursuing their passion for travelling through Spain and France to meet up with friends.

Bryan is very appreciative for all those who were unable to attend Janet's service and who 'raise a glass' and 'toasted her' at some convenient point on the day of her service.

We all salute you Janet and you will be sadly missed by all of us for all your wonderful attributes including, in Bryan's own words "a wiz using the computer"

Desmond Hogben – Isle of Wight Branch

IOW Branch are very sad to report that S/M Desmond Hogben has crossed the bar aged 87.

He was born in Ryde, in April 1933, one of four children to Anna and George Hobgen. He described his formative years as being poor but happy, and during the war, his two brothers joined the RAF. Desmond's father was too old to sign up, and instead joined the home guard, while his mother worked as a warden. Schooled in Ryde, he left at 14 to join Saro as an apprentice joiner and woodworking machinist.

At 18, he was called up for national service. He joined the Army Parachute regiment and spent a year in the UK and another in Cyprus, transported by the Royal Navy. It seemed to him a good life, and he transferred to the Royal Navy as a regular, signing up for 12 years.

Desmond became a veteran for his time in Korea, French Indo-china, Suez and Malaysia. He was also seconded with the Australian Navy, serving in Vietnam, and was at sea during the cold war.

Mr Hobgen married in the early 1950s and had a son, Bryan. He and his wife drifted apart due to long periods away and later divorced. Upon leaving the Royal Navy in 1980 after 30 years of service, he went to Saudi Arabia as an officer — to teach and train fire rescue personnel.

He spent five years in the country, and during this time, on leave, he met his future wife Maggie at Yelf's Hotel. The pair wrote to each other often, and their letters in and out of the country would be censored. They married in Florida, and the happy couple travelled around the world on holiday. After finishing his contract with Saudi Arabia, the couple spent time in Spain.

At home on the Isle of Wight, in Ryde, he went to work at the auction rooms in Shanklin. He enjoyed his time as an auctioneer and valuer. Sadly in 2010, he had a bad stroke and could not read, write or talk for a while. His wife Maggie helped him recover by going through the alphabet with him, teaching him to read and write again.

It is impossible to give justice to his exciting and event packed life within a short exposé as it would have to encompass a variety of aspects which not only helped shape the UK Entertainment Industry, but also the RNA Torrevieja Branch where he had been a member since 06/10/2004 following his retirement and subsequently took up the mantle as the President from 2008 to 2012 after moving to Santa Pola, Spain in 2008.

His dedicated time to the RBL Gran Alacant & La Marina branch where he served as the Chairman, along with his support to the RBL Spain District North where he served as Poppy Appeal Co-ordinator from 2011 and where his fundamental nature to care and support others



contributed to the spectacular achievement in raising €169,622.40 for the 2018 appeal, when he then handed over to Esther Navarro.

As well as his time as a Sea Cadet prior to his contribution during his service in the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve (RNVR) from when he joined on board HMS Flying Fox on 27/11/1958 and then through each year of his 17 days annual service which included taking part in several NATO exercises, in addition to all his performances at various entertainment events until his discharge on 17/11/1975.

Let alone from all the significant and versatile experiences of his career in showbiz through many roles within UK entertainment industry, right from when he was living in Leicester with his parent's and his first soiree at the Leicester Opera House with an involuntary appearance in a Christmas Panto and where he got 'hooked on the theatre', then through his 'tap dancing, banjulele playing reciter of monologues' as a member of a local church group when he moved back to Bristol with his family.

Followed by his time performing with the Mary Reynolds Juvenile Dance School and his first venture into the 'big time' at the age of 12 when the Juveniles appeared live on BBC TV during Saturday Prime Time on the Charlie Chester Show.

Then through his multitude of appearances where he was telling a few jokes, singing and performing magic tricks at numerous concert parties, local clubs and his first residency as the regular Sunday night compere at the Bristol Rovers Supporters club and through some successes in talent shows culminating in being invited to appear at the Lord Mayors Variety Command Performance, billed as Bristol's Teenage Comedian, then on through his time as a Redcoat Entertainer at Butlins following an audition for Wally Goodman, followed by a stint managing the TOP Rank bingo hall at Smethwick before returning to performing in the clubs in Bristol and all of this was only in his early years!

Including his time from 1971 when presenting a Bristol local television channel pub quiz programme with an element of darts, appearances in Dr Who and Northanger Abbey as well as presenting Radio shows for BBC Radio Bristol where his guests included local personalities and other celebrities including Tony Blackburn.

And especially the period from 1977 when he received a life changing phone call from Cunard who were looking for a DJ to join a world cruise within 3 days and in Robin's own word, "My feet didn't touch the ground as I wrapped up my affairs in Bristol and flew out to join the ship in Genoa" and on through his career to Senior Cruise Director and his retirement in 1991, during which time he had the fortune to work with celebrities such as Norman Collier, Max Bygraves, Hermione Gingold, Dame Alicia Markova, Reg Varney and Pearl Carr & Teddy Johnson where in his own words "with whom I spent many happy days in absolute hysterics."

Not forgetting to all the rich and rewarding times he spent with his family and friends.

23 rd	1856	Queen Victoria reviewed Fleet at Spithead; 240 ships, many having just returned from Baltic and Black Sea.
24 th	1916	Submarine E 22 conducted 'float-off' trials of two Sopwith Schneider seaplanes (Nos 3730, 3743). The purpose of this first submarine/aircraft trial was to achieve an up-threat interdiction of Zeppelins over the North Sea.
25 th	1953	The extension of the Portsmouth naval war memorial commemorating officers and men from Portsmouth-manned ships and ratings of the Portsmouth port division lost in the Second World War unveiled by HM Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother.
26 th	2011	Admiral of the Fleet Sir Henry Leach, First Sea Lord 1979–1982, died.
27 th	1937	The National Maritime Museum at Greenwich was opened by HM King George VI. His Majesty, with HM The Queen and HRH Princess Elizabeth, and the First Lord of the Admiralty, embarked at Westminster Pier in the launch of the C-in-C The Nore and, escorted by the destroyer <i>Wishart</i> and MTBs 3, 4, 5 and 6, went downriver and disembarked at the RN College, Greenwich. At the Museum 'the male staffs were all in morning dress, the hire of which they paid for themselves, the warders in their recently provided uniforms'. The Museum opened to the public on 29 April.
28 th	1972	Patrol vessels <i>Wasperton</i> , <i>Wolverton</i> and <i>Monkton</i> arrived at HMS <i>Tamar</i> to join the Sixth Patrol Craft Squadron in Hong Kong after a 16,461-mile voyage, having sailed from Britain on 12 January. They joined <i>Yarnton</i> and <i>Beachampton</i> which had arrived the previous September from service with the Ninth MCM Squadron in Bahrain.
29 th	1867	Canned meat added to ships' victualling stores.
30th	1943	The Man Who Never Was. Operation Mincemeat. A corpse given identity of Captain, Acting Major, William Martin, RM, put into the sea from the submarine <i>Seraph</i> off Huelva, Spain. He carried secret papers intended to deceive the enemy, through German agents in Spain, that Allies intended to invade Sardinia and not Sicily. The story was told by the intelligence officer who planned the operation, Lt-Cdr Ewen Montagu, RNVR, in his book <i>The Man Who Never Was</i> , and by former First Lord, Duff Cooper, in his novel <i>Operation Heartbreak</i> .
