
From the General Secretary

A Few Church Notices concerning the Parade.....

- **Essential – You carry with you photo ID and your Association Membership Card. A Met Police Officer and member of RNA staff will be at ingress points.**
- Rig - Blazer/Jacket Association Tie (RN will be in Number 1 Uniform)
- Standard Bearers – Room for changing/stowing kit available from 0900 at Civil Service Club, Great Scotland Yard (ten minute walk from King Charles Street)
- Standard Bearers muster in King Charles Street at 1010 for brief by Parade Commander
- Wreaths – Please feel free to bring a wreath they will be collected during the parade review and placed on the Cenotaph
- Shipmates should muster in King Charles Street by 1015 ready for Parade brief by the Parade Commander, Shipmate Bob Coburn at **1025**

3. ★ 2021 Royal Naval Association Conference – Nottingham 4/5 September 2021

Change was a major theme at the 2021 National Conference in Nottingham – change, and the passing of time...

The main feature of this year's gathering at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in the city centre was a change of command ceremony. Vice Admiral John McAnally became National President two decades ago, taking over an organisation that was struggling to stem a steady fall in membership numbers as time took its inevitable toll. But, as was reported during the business part of proceedings on Saturday, he leaves an Association that has regained a measure of confidence, having adopted a radical plan that saw subscriptions ended in favour of donations.

That model – crucially underpinned by the Royal Navy and Royal Marines Charity (RNRMC) which, in the immediate aftermath of the switch, has guaranteed the RNA would not suffer a shortfall in income – has seen new members join in their thousands, and with the country emerging from lockdowns, hopes are high that that upward trajectory can be maintained and even improved upon. Vice Admiral McAnally deemed it an appropriate time to hand over the



helm to a new man – Vice Admiral Duncan Potts, who retired from the Royal Navy in 2018, and officially took up his new role as National President in the closing stages of the Conference.

Another handover at the end of proceedings saw Central Office stalwart S/M Nigel Huxtable succeeded as Membership Support Manager by Sara Field, a former Chief Writer with 25 years' service in the Mob, who has been Nigel's deputy since the start of the year. Both Vice Admiral McAnally and S/M Nigel were given a rousing send-off at the excellent gala dinner that followed the AGM.



The business of the day was completed relatively quickly – there was just one National Council proposal to consider, a tweak to the Supplements Charter which allowed for valuable continuity in the roles of National Chairman and National Vice Chairman. The proposal was accepted unanimously by the 75 delegates (12 of whom 'attended' virtually by Zoom conference call).

The swift conclusion of business allowed members to enjoy a range of presentations about the Navy past and present, and a new initiative to help banish

loneliness in older Naval veterans.

Following a welcome from the Lord Mayor of Nottingham, Cllr David Trimble, Cdre Rob Bellfield, Naval Regional Commander Eastern England, gave an honest and upbeat appraisal of the current disposition of the Royal Navy.

His assessment was supported later in the programme by a world premiere of the RN Presentation Team's latest blockbuster production – a powerful film overlaid with commentary from two young members of the Senior Service, steward AB Loren Jackson and Royal Marine L/Cpl Kai Baker, under the watchful eye of team leader Lt Ollie Johnson.



RNA Welfare Programme Manager Lynda Person organised a presentation about Sparko TV, in which Sparko CEO Orit Eyal-Fibeesh demonstrated to delegates the many benefits of this television-based Internet package that allows elderly Naval veterans to easily keep in touch with relatives and shipmates, access tailored content such as Naval films and video, and take part in virtual communal activities such as bingo, quizzes and special interest meetings.



The historical perspective was provided by S/M Ralph Dodd, who, at the request of RNA General Secretary S/M Bill Oliphant, delivered a fascinating 'Fireside Chat' about the Royal Navy in the build-up to World War 2 and the early months of the conflict. These Fireside Chats were introduced during the first pandemic lockdown as a means for members to meet online and learn about a wide range of



Naval topics, and the series, delivered by shipmates as well as some experts and specialists, has become a Monday evening staple.

There were some new names in the frame when the winners of the President's Awards for Recruiting and Gift Aid Returns were announced.

The Sword of Honour for the Area with the greatest increase in membership in 2020 went to Area 10; the Brigg's Dirk for larger branches was won by the City of Glasgow, the Brigg's Rose Bowl for branches of 30 members or fewer went to the City of Salisbury; the Certificate for larger overseas branches was won by Port Philip Bay in Australia, while the Certificate for smaller overseas branches was won by Japan. Area 9 took the Tasker Bowl for Gift Aid returns.

While this summary can only provide a snapshot of the weekend's activities – no room to mention the drumhead service on Sunday, nor the fire alarm in the small hours of Friday morning (!) – there seemed to be a general consensus that Nottingham was a very good Conference indeed, made all the better for shipmates being able to meet up in person for the first time in two years (the 2020 version was held online).



And now all eyes turn to Portsmouth 2022, and commemorations marking the 40th anniversary of the Falklands Conflict that will be an integral part of the programme.

4. ★ November Remembrance Sunday Parade – Cenotaph Whitehall

Shipmates whilst we are on the parade theme can I advise you that the RNA has 100 tickets available for Shipmates to participate in the Cenotaph Remembrance Parade on Sunday 14 November.

For those of you who have not had an opportunity to march previously, the programme is as follows:

Arrive Horseguards 0900 – 0930 - RNA Platoon - Rig RNA No1 with medals. RNA Foul Weather Jacket may be worn. Make sure you are well wrapped up as the wind can make it chilly! (Don't forget your hip flask!)

Once fallen in on Horseguards platoons are marched out onto Whitehall and wait for formal service of remembrance to complete then march down Whitehall past the Cenotaph back round to Horseguards by the Guards Memorial. Once marching it takes 20 minutes and is conducted in front of hundreds of people.

Comment from Shipmate Andy Christie (RNA Ops Man) –

If you have never taken part before at this occasion, can I encourage you to come along and experience it. The feeling of camaraderie is just unique, the sense of belonging to this organised crowd of 10,000 servicemen and women makes you so proud you would probably sign on again if you could! More importantly this is the occasion to take time in my busy life and remember the 'Fallen', who never made it home and so the sore knees and aches caused by parade pail into insignificance with the sacrifice they have made.

So as in the famous words of Delia Smith..... "Let's be having you"



8. ★ RN Memories - Navy Days Portsmouth

For well over half a century, for a few days each year, the UK's great naval bases and air stations opened their doors to the public to show them what the Senior Service was all about.

The idea of organised showcase events first came to Admiral Sir Osmond de Brock, at that time Commander-in-Chief Portsmouth, when he suggested in 1927 that a handful of Portsmouth-based ships could be opened to the general public, primarily to raise funds for Naval charities – the legacy of the Great War was a great many disabled veterans, war widows and orphans who could do with extra support.

The concept was such a success that Chatham and Plymouth staged their own events the following year, and the whole idea snowballed.

Punters flocked in from all parts of the UK to the various events, with coach tours and special excursion trains helping make them accessible, and for just a shilling or so (sixpence for the nippers) Joe Public could rub shoulders with Jack and clamber all over mighty ships including battle cruiser HMS Hood and battleships HMS Rodney and Renown.

Navy Weeks came to an end in 1938, and with the Fleet still busy in the aftermath of World War 2 it was 1948 before Navy Days reappeared on the calendar.

As well as justifying the expenditure on the Navy, such events also acted as effective recruitment exercises, as potential matelots got the chance to talk to the genuine article and hear heart-stopping tales from the front line – no doubt, in some cases, embellished for effect, depending on the audience.

Navy Weeks, and latterly Navy Days, saw military and industrial complexes converted into maritime and aviation wonderlands, thrilling youngsters and supporters who were able to get close up to some awe-inspiring pieces of kit.

Using a combination of military displays, fairground-style attractions (the divers in a glass tank of water always proved very popular, especially with the chance to play noughts-and-crosses thrown in) and trade show stands, Navy Days gave the British public a very visible reminder of what their taxes were being used for, and a chance to “see the ships – meet the men”...

Indeed, by the 1960s the value for such events to the Navy was difficult to overstate.

The subject was raised in the House of Commons in May 1961 when the Civil Lord of the Admiralty, Ian Orr-Ewing, was asked what plans there were for Navy Days and Navy Air Days that summer.


As reported in Hansard, the politician replied that “Two or three Navy Days will be held at each of the naval ports at Portsmouth, Devonport, Rosyth and Portland. One Air Day will be held at each of the seven air stations.”

When pressed on attendance figures, Mr Orr-Ewing said: “More than a quarter of a million people attended the open Navy Days and Air Days last year and the figure is increasing rather than decreasing.

“This is an excellent way of bringing the Navy into the eyes of the public, not just potential recruits, but parents, women and children who visit our ships. These are certainly a popular form of outing for many families.”

The Navy Air Days that summer were staged at HMS Ariel (Lee-on-Solent), RNAS Arbroath, RNAS Yeovilton, RNAS Abbotsinch, RNAS Culdrose, RNAS Brawdy and RNAS Lossiemouth.

In a mood of nostalgia, S/M Andy Christie dug out a Navy Days Portsmouth brochure from 1979, and thought it might be worth sharing with shipmates.



Held over the Bank Holiday weekend of August 25-27, the event attracted thousands of visitors to the naval base, with some travelling a considerable distance to be there.

The reward was a range of ships that were open to visitors, and many more that could be scrutinised from the jetties.

The two heavyweights that took top billing at the show were assault ship HMS Intrepid, at that stage a relatively youthful 12 years into her Service career and later part of the Falklands task group, and the older helicopter carrier HMS Bulwark, the Centaur-class vessel that was commissioned as a light aircraft carrier in 1954 and was converted to an anti-submarine helicopter carrier in 1979, the work being completed just months before Navy Days.

One ship listed to appear had less than three years left of her Naval career.

Type 42 destroyer HMS Coventry was billed in the programme as “one of the Royal Navy’s newest warships”, having been accepted into service earlier the same year.

The destroyer was part of the task force sent to recapture the Falklands in the spring of 1982, and was sunk by bombs dropped from Argentine aircraft on May 25, with the loss of 19 men.

Coventry’s sister ship HMS Newcastle was also slated to appear in the event, as well as older County-class guided missile destroyer HMS Kent, a popular feature of previous Navy Days.

Among the other vessels selected for public display were three frigates – Leander-class ships HMS Diomedes and Scylla and Rothesay-class ship HMS Lowestoft – submarine HMS Onyx (another vessel which would go on to play a role in the Falklands), survey ships HMS Bulldog and Beagle and tanker RFA Tidepool, which joined the Falklands campaign in 1982.

Apart from the ships, visitors to the Naval Base in 1979 could enjoy trips around the harbour, courtesy of the RN Auxiliary Service and their inshore minesweepers (40p per adult).

It was not just about the ships in 1979, of course – there were helicopter flying displays, unarmed combat demonstrations, concerts by the Royal Marines Band, the Sheffield Sea Cadets Band, the band of the Royal Anglian TAVR and that of the Nautical Training Corps, and a multitude of stands, exhibitions and displays featuring, inter alia, RN Comms, the School of Maritime Ops, RN engineering, the Career Service, MOD Police, SSAFA, the Automobile Association, St John’s Ambulance Brigade, NatWest Bank, the RNLI, RN divers and the Senior Service medical and dental teams.

Friday 17 Jun 22 – Start of RNA hosted Falklands 40 (F40) commemoration and National Conference weekend in Portsmouth, to ‘reunite, relive, and remember’. Special Interest Groups and other shipmates will reunite for an evening reception and function.

Saturday 18 June 22 – Following a shorter AGM than usual, we will sensitively relive the Conflict with a Portsmouth Cathedral based ‘symposium’, hosted by an academic and well known celebrity, plus 3 or 4 accounts from participants and others. An evening event will be planned too.

Sunday 19 Jun 22 – RNA/Naval Associations Parade – Old Portsmouth. Those related to the Naval Service are invited to march with their Shipmates with the RNA National, Area and Branch Standards for a 1100 start, Service of Remembrance at the Falklands monument, followed by the City of Portsmouth unveiling a new memorial, and presenting the RNA and RMA with Freedom of the City scrolls. F40 commemorations are then likely to conclude with a late morning short service, and refreshments, back in Portsmouth’s ‘Cathedral of the Sea’.

12. ★ RNA 'SPARKO' TV Project

Comradeship is one of the core values of the RNA, and the Association works hard to ensure that older shipmates who cannot get out and about very easily do not feel isolated.

The Internet and social media make it easy connecting people around the world – so long as you can use the technology. Some people just find it tricky to get their heads around the finer points of Skype, Zoom, FaceTime, Youtube and the like – logging in can be a faff, establishing connections, updating software and the like are not always straightforward, and people can feel vulnerable with regards to online security. But there is now a way to make video calls, join online classes or talks and enjoy entertainment tailored for the senior community, all through a simple, dedicated system that plugs in to your television set. Essentially, Sparko is a simplified version of the Internet which can be accessed from the comfort of your sofa/armchair, through your TV. And thanks to the Royal Navy and Royal Marines Charity (RNRMC), that option is available for free to shipmates in the RNA.


The kit and service is provided by Sparko, a British 'virtual retirement community' which operates through interactive TV equipment. The Sparko TV kit is a small box which plugs in to a standard TV and comes with a small camera and a very simple remote control. The whole package comes with help and technical support if you need it.

Sparko brings people together using simple digital technology – your nearest and dearest can access the system using a free smartphone app. Once setup, Sparko enables you to make video calls to family and friends, watch specially-chosen films from an extensive library (including some of the old classics), learn new skills, pick up a new hobby, or take part in games. The system was trialled with the help of branches of Age UK, who welcomed Sparko with enthusiasm.

The Sparko tool does not interrupt or interfere with your normal TV programmes – the camera is only activated if a person is on a video call or taking part in a live/class activity, and will show a small light when it is in operation. A privacy slider for the camera is included to cover the lens when it is not in use to ensure peace of mind. There was a very special surprise for John Goodman, who celebrated his 100th birthday at Tegfield House care home in Winchester on Thursday 12th August.

To recognise his distinguished service in the Royal Navy during World War 2, the Royal Naval Association presented him with a Certificate of Appreciation. Stewart Maclean, Parade Marshall of the Association's Area 3, accompanied by Standard Bearer Richard Shenton, made the presentation. As well as the Certificate, National Chairman, Keith Ridley wrote John a personal

letter on behalf of the National Council to thank him for his service and convey their best wishes on his special birthday.



John's birthday was celebrated at Tegfield House in Chilbolton Avenue, Winchester, where he was joined by his family members, residents, and staff for the presentation, followed by tea and the cutting of a 100th birthday cake. Born at Wotter in Dartmoor, Devon, John and his family moved to Plymouth when he was 11 where he attended Devonport High School. Having passed his A-levels, John was due to go to university to study English and French. However, with the outbreak of World War 2 in 1939, he joined the Royal Navy instead.

He served as an officer in many ships including HMS *Gambia*, *King George VI* (which sunk the *Bismarck*) and HMS *Fiji* (which was torpedoed). John sailed the world with the Royal Navy including as part of the Arctic Convoys. His overseas postings included Singapore, Malta, Gibraltar, Hong Kong and South Africa. Leaving the Royal Navy in 1971, John was Bursar of St Swithun's School, Winchester, until his retirement. John also voluntarily taught chess to children in a local primary school.

John married his wife, June, during WWII and they were together for 65 years, until June passed away. Together, they have four children, Rosemary, Peter, Fiona and Lucy. He also has 13 grandchildren, 13 great grandchildren and two great-great grandchildren.

John was for 10 years a resident (Brother) of the St Cross Almshouse and made Brother Emeritus when he moved to Tegfield House in June. A lover of jazz music and Frank Sinatra, John's other hobbies include supporting Plymouth Argyle Football Club and hockey. He was a hockey player and umpire and attends Winchester Hockey Club games every Saturday with his daughters. For his long-standing support, the Club made him an Honorary Vice-President.

John's other celebrations included a birthday tea at the Hotel du Vin, Winchester with his family, and attending Matins at the Church of St Cross before enjoying birthday coffee and cake with The Brothers.

Jo Aitken, Manager of Tegfield House, says: "It is such a pleasure to have John and his family as part of our Tegfield family. It was a real delight to make his day even more special with the Royal Naval Association and his family coming to join us. It is a day none of us will forget for a long time."

Dear Sir,



The Department for Transport shared designs showing an updated number plate without the distinctive blue band on the left-hand side:

New registration plates without the EU flag have been issued from 1 January 2021. Although existing versions will still be valid, the new designs will be used when renewing a licence or printing a new plate.

Although current lockdown rules prevent most UK drivers from leaving the country, motorists won't need to display a GB sticker in most EU countries if their number plate has GB or GB with a Union Flag on it.

A spokesman for the Department for Transport said: "UK number plates (and driving licences) have been given a makeover to signify the beginning of a new chapter for the UK.

"The new designs coincide with the beginning of a number of agreements recently made between the UK and member states for British drivers, making it easier for Britons to drive in the EU when existing restrictions end."

However, there is an alternative to the new approved designs, but don't expect it to become road-legal in the UK (or Europe) anytime soon!



1st	1836	Rum withdrawn from accompanying women and children who became entitled to tea and sugar in lieu.	
2nd	1950	Lt-Cdr HRH The Duke of Edinburgh RN took command of the sloop Magpie in the Second Frigate Squadron based at Malta. The ship had served in Walker's Second escort Group in the Battle of the Atlantic.	
3rd	1942	Having safely delivered the damaged battleship Queen Elizabeth to the eastern seaboard of the USA, the destroyers Pathfinder, Quentin and Vimy were attacked by, and sank, U-162 off Trinidad. The German CO, Fregattenkapitan Jurgen Wattenburg, had been an officer in Graf Spee. He escaped internment in Argentina, returned to Germany and trained as a submariner. As a POW in Arizona, he again escaped for thirty-six days.	
4th	1964	Frigate Lowestoft, Cdr M.W.G. 19 th	1810	Captains who had missed flag rank through becoming Commissioners of the Navy, Victualling or Transport Boards allowed to wear the undress uniform of a rear-admiral with plain epaulettes and the buttons of their Board.
20 th	1873	Boats of Thalia and Midge destroyed three pirate junks and a fort in the Larut River, Perak.
21 st	1944	10th Submarine Flotilla disbanded. White Ensign hauled down at HMS Talbot, Malta.
22 nd	2001	Operations against Taliban regime in Afghanistan. Two Royal Navy SSNs fired TLAMs against shore targets. Support for land forces provided by Illustrious, Cornwall and Southampton. Operation Veritas.

Cuthbert, Flag Officer Flotillas, Home Fleet, during exercises 30 miles S. of Iceland. Fire in the cruiser and thirty-two casualties. Capt Sarell was reprimanded at Chatham Court Martial 5 November for hazarding his ship but he was not the last Captain to do so.
